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Endangered Species in Florida

Join us at our March meeting to learn about endangered wildlife in Florida from Natasha Warraich, a biologist with the Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission.

Warraich is assistant regional biologist in the species conservation planning section of the commission and works with threatened and imperiled terrestrial species in South Florida – everything from birds to bats, butterflies to bees, and snakes. If it lives on land, she'll probably work with it some day.

Florida's wildlife faces many threats, especially the degradation and fragmentation of habitat. A big part of Warraich's job is helping stakeholders find the best ways to avoid harming animals and their habitats.

Warraich was previously a park services specialist at Jonathan Dickinson State Park, where she helped coordinate research and conducted education for park visitors. She has

a master's degree in environmental science from Florida Atlantic University and was a technician at FAU's Marine Lab at Gumbo Limbo Environmental Complex, helping manage the sea turtle lab.

April is for voting in AAUW

Profit from benefit luncheon tops \$7,000

The board of our charitable foundation will have a problem this year – but it's one they'll delight in solving.

They'll have to figure out the details for distributing more than \$7,330 profit from our benefit luncheon for local scholarships, Tech Trek, and the national AAUW Fund.

Thanks to the hard work of benefit chair Gayle Cratty and her committee, and the generosity of dedicated members and guests that's almost 70 percent more than the almost \$4,360 profit last year.

94 members and guests on Saturday, February 10, heard the keynote address of Lynda Figueredo, CBS12 anchor and investigative reporter, "Learning How to Adapt to a Changing Industry," and enjoyed lunch at Seasons 52 in Palm Beach Gardens. (See photos, page 3.)

A \$30 tax-deductible donation was part of each luncheon ticket, and other donations were about \$2,500. A special thanks to

speaker Figueredo who donated her \$100 honorarium to Tech Trek

Money hat tickets brought in \$525. Proceeds from the Opportunity Auction baskets were \$1,190, and from the silent auction, about \$1,270. All the centerpieces were sold, bringing in another \$255. Paid reservations for 96 minus expenses rounded out the profit.

Looking ahead to next year's benefit, they used a Plus/Delta evaluation process, listing factors that worked (pluses) and those for improvement (delta).





Change in foundation bylaws needed

The bylaws of our charitable foundation specify where the funds we raise can be distributed.

To include TechTrek and the new scholarship honoring the Friends of the North Palm Beach Library, we have to amend the bylaws – and it has to be done before proceeds from this year's benefit luncheon may be distributed.

We're all members of the foundation and will vote on the amendment at our April 16 branch meeting. The bylaws require a 30-day advance notice of the amendment proposal which follows:

ARTICLE XIII DISTRIBUTION OF FUNDS Section 1. Overview. The Foundation Board of Directors shall distribute funds raised to these programs.

- a. Nationally: To one or more of the programs included in the AAUW Fund or AAUW tax-deductible funds, and
- b. State: To any of the charitable and educational programs included in the income tax deductible AAUW Florida Supporting Foundation, Inc., such as the AAUW Florida Tech Trek Camp for Girls, and
- c. Locally: For the Doris Karlik Local Scholarship Fund and the AAUW Scholarship in honor of the Friends of the North Palm Beach Public Library. ◆

National proposes dropping member degree requirement

Should AAUW membership be open to those who don't have a degree but who support the organization's mission?

Should the national board of directors include those who are not members of AAUW?

Should three-year staggered terms be created for service on the national board of directors?

Those are questions you'll be asked to answer in voting that starts in April on proposed amendments to the national AAUW bylaws.

Voting opens April 25 and closes June 9 at 9 p.m. ET. You'll get a voter PIN by email or by postal mail. Complete information on the proposals will be in the spring *AAUW Outlook* magazine.

You'll have until May 7 to ask for a paper ballot, which must be mailed and postmarked by May 21 at 11:59 ET. Voting results will be announced online June 10.

Pros and cons

The national board of directors proposed the changes, sending an email explanation to members – www.aauw.org/resource/national-election/. The board also provided its rationale along with the exact wording of the bylaws' changes at https://svc.aauw.org/recore/docu/aauw-bylaws-2017.pdf.

The two proposals about board service are seen as best practices bringing AAUW in line with other nonprofits.

The more wide-reaching and contentious proposal to drop the degree requirement has come up for a vote before and did not pass. So it will be up to members to again weigh in on what would be a major shift in AAUW.

The board believes the degree requirement isn't needed now. It

also believes dropping it would align better with our mission; bring in more members and increase our impact; enhance diversity and inclusion; and make it easier to get grants and corporate donations.

Members who disagree have commented online, saying, among other things, that the issue was already decided; that the proposal takes away a factor that differentiates AAUW from other groups advocating equity; and that it dilutes the message that getting a college education is important.
